PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE,

January, 2012

A New Year, time to stop pondering your rose garden changes and get into full swing of implementing them! I entered the fall thinking that I would only make a few minor changes, just dig out one bed and plant all new roses (15). But I then started looking at my drip system and realized it was not doing very well as some heads were definitely blocked and some lines were cracking. I decided to replace ALL my lines with IN-LINE drip, and as one line has over 100 roses on it I decided to split the line, this meant digging up the lawn and adding a valve. When I undertook this I was not expecting to lay 1,000 ft. of line!!

Rose bushes are true survivors and if 2011 was a bad year for them, 2012 can be their time to demonstrate what they can do, with a little help from you. From my perspective, (I am not going to get into the details of pruning as we have a complete page on this subject), I do not prune too hard. I leave my bushes 2' to 3' tall with 6 to 10 canes, similar to the way we prune at the MCC Rose Garden. This provides more blooms. I go for more flowers rather than a few very large flowers.

We have our pruning marathon at the Mesa Community College Rose Garden starting January 7th. We encourage everyone to come out and help prune a bush or two, or ten, or If you are unsure about pruning your bushes at home, this is an ideal time to bring your questions. We will have demonstrations by a Consulting Rosarian (YES - EVERY consulting Rosarian is required to put in hours, we expect you to sign up) every Saturday in January and February at 9:00am. Bring a neighbor and a friend.

ROSE CARE CORNER for January

January Rose Care

January is generally the busiest month for rose gardeners, as we plant our new roses and begin pruning our established rose bushes.

Why do we prune roses?

Roses don't really go dormant in our climate so we need to help them rest in order to store up sugars and starches to produce spring growth. Pruning your bush will reduce the number of canes and the stored energy in the remaining canes will be directed to a few bud eyes resulting in longer stems and larger blooms. Also the bush will direct some of its energy to producing new basal canes.

When to prune?

You can start to prune your roses in late December and you should be finished by February. You run the risk of frost damage to new growth if you prune before late December.

Equipment Needed:

1. Long sleeved leather gloves (helps protect your arms) Long sleeve gloves will be for sale on Saturday mornings in the MCC Rose Garden during January and February.
2. Pruning shears (must have bypass blades)
3. Loppers (to cut those big older woody canes)
4. Pruning saw (narrow blade allows you to get into smaller areas to prune)
5. Wire brush (use to remove debris from bud union and it also encourages new basal breaks)

Pruning your roses:

Hybrid tea & Grandiflora – Prune your roses to about ½ of their current height. Cut out all dead, spindly and crossing canes. Dead canes should be removed at the **bud union** to make room for new basal breaks. Cut ¼ inch above an outward facing bud eye. Always cut at a 45-degree angle, sloping down. When old woody canes fail to produce good blooms, remove them by cutting them back to the bud union. Strip all leaves off remaining canes and throw them away.

Floribunda – These bushes are more compact and the canes are smaller. You will generally end up with 8 to 12 healthy canes. Cut out all dead and crossing canes. Strip all leaves off remaining canes and throw away.

Shrub Roses – Cut back about 1/3 of the bush and prune like other roses.

Miniature Roses – Cut back about 1/3 to ½ of the bush and prune like other roses.

Climbing Roses – They should be pruned to fit on a trellis or wall. Remove any dead wood and weak canes. Do not cut more than 1/3 off the length of the main canes. The best blooms are on laterals growing from two to three year old wood and can be trained by arching and tying them in a horizontal position. This induces every bud to produce a flowering branch. Remove all leaves and throw away.

After pruning, clean up all debris around the roses. Spray the canes and soil with a fungicide and insecticide. This will kill any powdery mildew spores or insects in the soil.

You will receive a letter of verification from the Chairperson, which must be presented at the school.

CURRENT CRs are required to attend a seminar or school every four years to remain on the active list.


